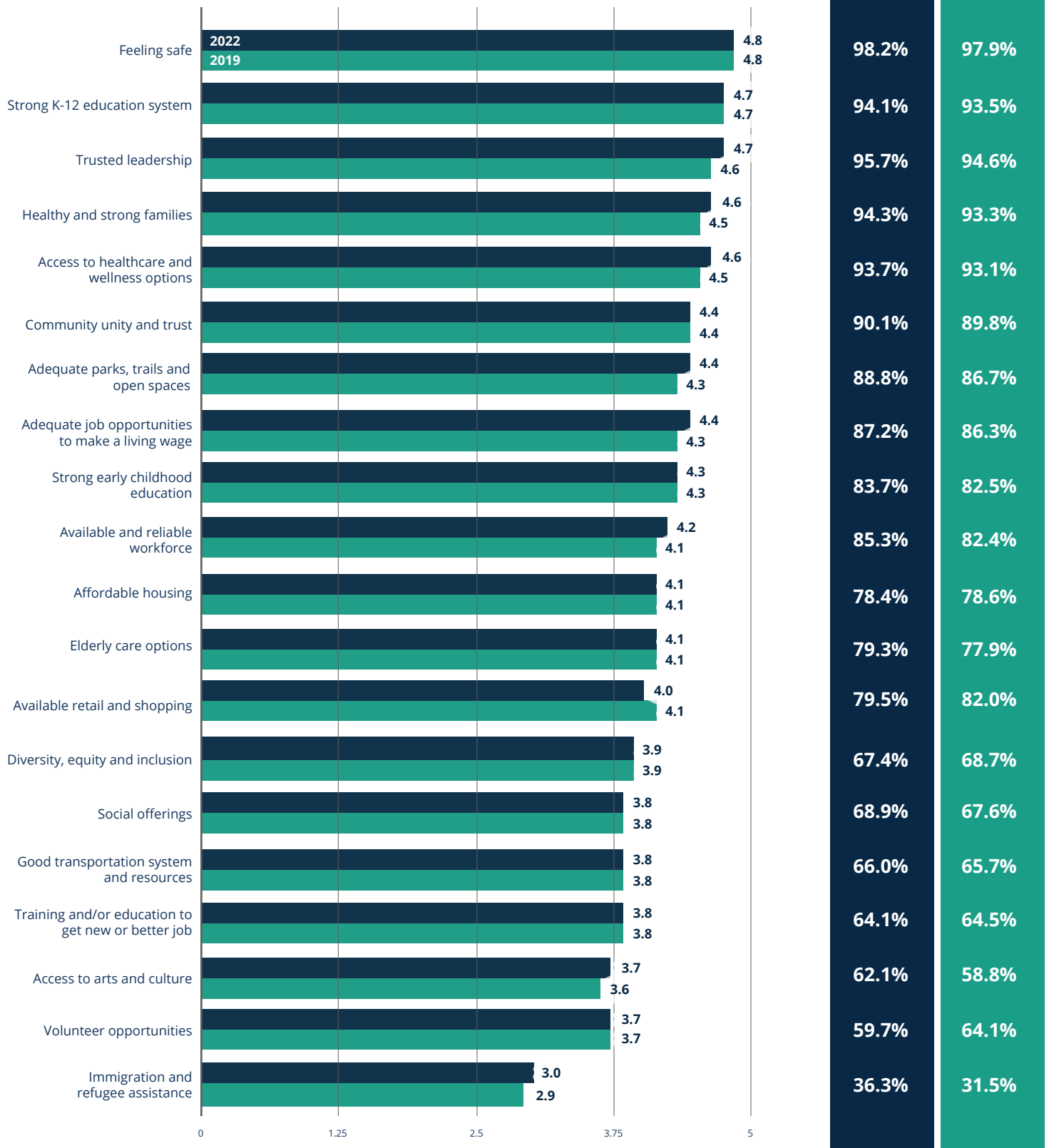
Assessment Methodology

The data presented in this supplement was provided by the Hendricks County Community Foundation representing data collected for their 2022 Hendricks County Community Needs Assessment—an update to the 2019 Community Needs Assessment. The Needs Assessment was distributed widely throughout Hendricks County (Indiana) with over 3,650 completed surveys.

In 2021, the population of Hendricks County was estimated as 179,355 (U.S. Census). For this dataset, 3,687 surveys were received from Hendricks County residents resulting in a confidence level of 99% with a 2.2% margin of error for the data reflecting the views of Hendricks County residents as a whole. 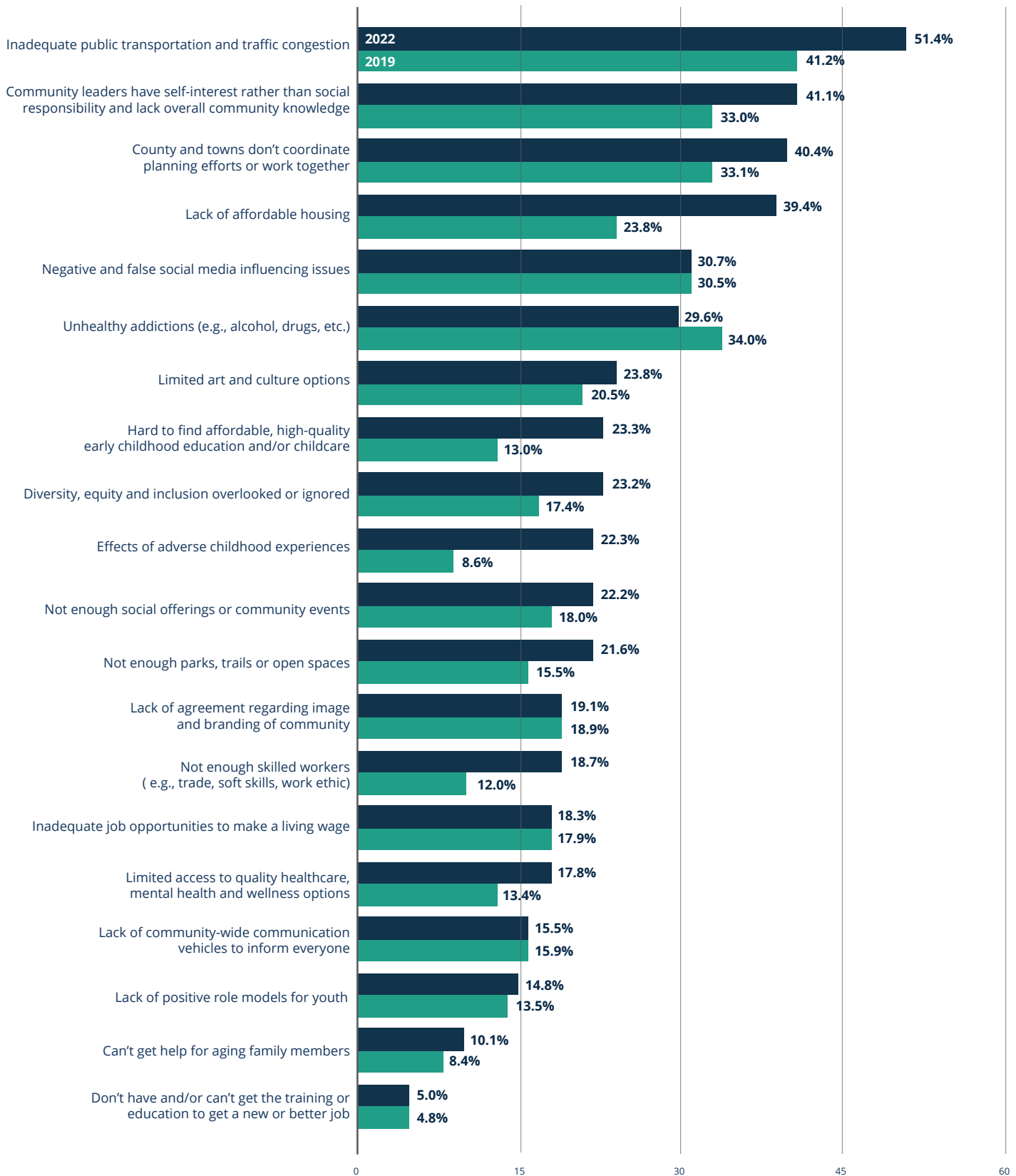
Community Assets

Summary of Assessment Update

The data presented in this report are a follow-up to the 2019 Hendricks County Community Needs Assessment. The questions remained the same in this 2022 survey with additional clarity around the needs and more extensive demographics questions.



In simple terms, the participants in this survey accurately reflect the population of Hendricks County and its key demographic groups, so its findings can be projected across the actual population with a great deal of confidence. The methodology is consistent with the standards used by demographers, social scientists, and grantmaking organizations.

In 2019, a major concern was the low response rate from people of color—4.5%. Though in 2022, we increased our percentage of individuals describing themselves as nonwhite to 12%, we still fell short of the 16% as outlined in the Census. While this gap does not weaken the statistical validity of the survey's findings, it does indicate a need to further engage people of color in our community.

Additional notable data points from 2019 to 2022:

- Assets remained unchanged from 2019 to 2022
- “Effects of adverse childhood experiences (ACE’s)” and “Hard to find affordable, high-quality early childhood education or childcare” both jumped 8 spots on the list of issues
- “Lack of community-wide communication vehicles to inform everyone” and “Lack of agreement regarding image and branding of community” both dropped 5 spots on the list of issues
- We asked clarifying questions regarding some of the issues in the original list. Here are the results:
 - o Issue 1: Traffic (77%) v. Public transportation (23%)
 - o Issue 2: Leaders are self-interested (67%) v. Leaders lack knowledge (33%)
 - o Issue 8: Childcare (69%) v. Early childhood education (31%)
 - o Issue 16: Mental health (59%) v. Wellness (27%) v. Healthcare (14%)
