## Hendricks County Community Foundation

In 2019, your Community Foundation competed our 2019 Needs Assessment at the beginning of our Community Unity work. This large project, encouraged and partially funded by Lilly Endowment Inc., surveyed our community to understand what you and our other neighbors saw as the most important assets and challenges in Hendricks County. The project took six months to complete and included responses from over 3,000 individuals, giving the survey a statistical 99% confidence with a 2% margin of error. That's a high rate of confidence and means the results safely could be applied to our community as a whole.

We planned to repeat the survey over the next decade to see what changes in these issues have occurred. I was surprised at the beginning of this year to realize that 2022 is the year for our first refresh of the survey results. So much has seemed to change in our community, nation and world since we completed the first Needs Assessment. But how have the needs changed? That's why we're doing the survey again!

Make your voice heard! The survey will officially be open August 1 to September 2, but we'd like to offer you the chance to get your response in today! ## **HCCF is Awarding ARPA Funds**

HCCF is working with the Hendricks County Commissioners to assist with the distribution of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to nonprofits working in Hendricks County. Working with the county's ARPA Planning Committee, the Community Foundation is designing and conducting a process to distribute up to \$6.6 million.

Noncompetitive grants of approximately \$5 million will be made to community organizations that, along with their clients, were most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Competitive grants will be offered through an annual application for the next three years, with the first application period starting August 1, 2022. Approximately \$1.5 million will be available through the three-year competitive grants, \$500,000 each year. Learn more and apply <u>here</u>.
