So HCCF sends checks to those nonprofits – over \$280,000 in 2022 – to support their work in our community. Our donors have started [funds](#) to support a wide-range of community organizations, almost 60 of them this year, ranging from our libraries, to our schools, to our churches, to our youth organizations.

HCCF Awards over \$280,000 in Designated Grants

HCCF awarded over **\$280,000** in grants this month to organizations in every corner of Hendricks County to support education, agriculture, health and human services, parks and recreation, senior services and more! These grants were made by our [Designated Funds](#), funds established by donors with a passion to support an organization important to them.

Here's a small sample of these impactful grants:

\$16,993 to the Parks Foundation of Hendricks County from the **Glen & Mildred Harlos Fund**

\$2,534 grant to Mill Creek Community Schools from the **Jackie Eggers Memorial Fund for Children**

\$2,202 grant to Leadership Hendricks County from the **Comer Family Leadership Fund**
